Updates

WOW! The Tradition Community started 2020 with upgrades at our amenities center; we painted the Pergola and the entire inside of the Pool House, added sound deadening tiles to the ceiling. We also added roller squeegees and new benches to the tennis courts. That was the good news and along came COVID-19. Other than the tennis court improvements the pool and pool house upgrades were not available to enjoy.

The board decided to close the pool and pool house for the year in an effort to protect the highly vulnerable members of Tradition. Before making this decision, we had discussions with our insurance carriers and our attorney. Insurance does not cover COVID-19 and a good lawyer can overturn waivers in court.

Not all, but most Tradition homeowners understood that the BOD is protecting our residents and family members from COVID-19 by these actions. Earlier this year 3 residents tested positive but were not serious enough to be hospitalized. Since then I have not heard of any additional positive cases. This is due to these efforts; but most of the credit goes to our residents' smart behavior to follow CDC Guidelines by wearing masks in public and practicing social distancing.

Landscaping

We started the year with high hopes to improve our common area landscaping. We were able to sod the corner of Deacon and TCD and add concrete bases for benches along Tradition Club Drive for walkers and bikers to take a break or just sit and talk to neighbors. We intended to add the benches as soon as the hurricane season ended. As usual it is all about money. I will elaborate more regarding the budget under the drainage heading. I want to thank Nick Riccio for donating a bench by the back pond exiting onto Kings River Road. There is a story in this newsletter about the dedication of that bench, be sure to read it.

Budget 2020

This year's budget was hit by two unexpected costs. The first was for \$6,000 to rid the ponds of Beavers. So far there has been no additional property damage. The second was \$4,200 for acoustical tiles in the Pool House. Neither were in the 2020 budget.



Drainage

It has always been my goal to increase home values and make Tradition a proud place to live. Home values are increasing but drainage issues continue to hold the board back from repaving our 25-year-old streets. We have spent \$405,539 on drainage repairs and one hurricane cleanup since 2016. As I write this we are looking at additional drainage repairs this year.

Our landscaping improvements are also restricted financially. I want to compliment homeowners who took advantage of COVID-19 to work on their yards this summer. Properties are better than ever and the Board wants to acknowledge everyone's efforts. The watering season is ending so check rust, mold and mailboxes and finish the year strong.

Street and Sidewalk Clearance

The growing season is slowing and we have begun to trim bushes and cut overhanging tree limbs along sidewalks and streets in common areas. While inspecting these areas we noticed many homeowners' trees overhanging the streets and sidewalks.

Reminder: Trees on your property are your responsibility and you must maintain them for sidewalk and street clearance.

Mailboxes

We are seeing black mailboxes with various items and glued on decorations. This is not permitted according to the covenants and you must remove everything from mailboxes other than small nametags on the front flap.

Committees

I want to thank members of our committees who have volunteered for many years serving our community. Jeanette Renault, Ken Dewell and Allan MacDonald are retiring from the Covenants Committee along with Francis Moeller from the ARB. Paul Kelly is stepping down from managing the Tradition license plate program after many years of service. Finally, Bill Renault is retiring from managing the advertising in our newsletter which paid for costs to print both the Neighborhood Directory and the Newsletter. Thank you to all.



Golf Course

While I was writing this article the golf course superintendent sent me 3 text messages showing houses on holes 7, 9, and 10 where these homeowners cleared golf course property to improve their view.

I also live on the golf course and understand wanting a better view but unfortunately it is not our property. **You cannot clear the golf course property**. The superintendent is considering contacting the police.

It is important that we maintain a good relationship with the Tradition Golf Club as there are times we have mutual issues. Unfortunately, I now have to be the bad guy and speak to these homeowners before the golf course takes action.

Fire arms, Bow and Arrows and Burning

None of these are permitted within the community property. I mention this because a property owner found a hunting arrow sticking upright on his lawn. Something like this could be deadly.

The Board Of Directors (BOD)

There are two board positions expiring in February 2021 at our next annual meeting, the seats of Dick Baughman and Frank D'Amato. I believe we have a strong board of 5 members with many years of business experience. I feel it is important to vote for Dick Baughman, our treasurer, and when you read his resume in January you will see his previous work history was managing homeowner associations.

As for me I have been on the board for 18 years and president for the last 17 years. Three years ago I said I would serve as long as I am healthy and you want me to continue. Thank God I am healthy so I will run again. Short term I am looking to improve the front entrance by spring, improve our common area wells to reduce the rust on sidewalks and curbs and continue to build our reserves to begin repaying streets.

All homeowners have a right to run for the board and submit a resume to any board member by January 1, 2021. However, I strongly recommend you keep this board intact as we re-write the Covenants Book and move forward on the improvements I mentioned above.



Storms

On April 14 we again had to deal with a storm that created tree and tree debris damage throughout the community. You should know we own the streets and do not have a street department. Our community landscaper is contracted for common areas.

It is a homeowner's responsibility to clean the debris from their trees that go into our streets. You or your lawn people need to blow the streets clean and pick it up for disposal. You must make sure the debris is not blown down street drains or we will have issues with flooding during storms.

ARB and Covenants Guidelines

When a home/property is purchased in The Tradition, the new owner receives a booklet: the *Architectural Review Board and Covenants Guidelines*. Work has begun to review, update, and clarify the content of these documents in an effort to improve readability and understanding of our community's guidelines and rules. This work is tedious and goes slowly but we will have this completed in 2021.

The original *Guidelines* were published in 2001, with subsequent Amendments in 2009, 2013, and 2014. We are working on another update.

ARCHITECTURE REVIEW BOARD

Sad to say that summer is over. It may not have been the best summer season but it was still summer. Things were sure different this year. I do hope next year will be much better. I have several things to go over in this newsletter and it may take more words than I am used to using in my articles but here we go.

First off you need to know that the Board of Directors has changed our fine schedule. The fines are much steeper now and it only makes it much more important that you do not do anything to the outside of your home without a permit. Please just call anyone on the ARB if you have questions. As usual the ARB will work with everyone to help prevent any fines from being issued.

The ARB is now requiring that any painting request must be submitted with a paint chip showing the exact color you want to use. In addition, the only colors that will be approved will be those colors that are on our current color pallet. No other colors will be approved.

We will be setting up a link to a Sherwin Williams website that will show the exact color chips and the corresponding Sherwin Williams's numbers. This does not mean you have to use Sherwin Williams' paints. You can use any paint manufacturer you wish but it must be a match to the Sherwin Williams color.

Please look for the link in the Tradition web site. It may take a few days to be set up but it will be coming soon. If need be we can show you the color pallet that we have but we cannot give it out. The ARB hopes these changes will make the color choices easier for all and it will make the process much simpler.

Thank you for your help with all the things the ARB has to do. I hope everyone has a great Thanksgiving and an even better Christmas season.



The Litchfield area certainly got a fresh updated look with the new road resurfacing this year but SC Department of Transportation is not quite finished with the details. You may have noticed the edging of the medians really took a hit from the truck activity. There are unsightly and bare median edges and shoulder berms. Grass is beginning to grow after two reseedings but has become ragged. The contractor is responsible for returning the median to its pre paving level in order for the SC DOT to sign off on the project so work will continue into June 2021. We are looking forward to seeing the medians back in shape.

Another fallout of the road resurfacing affected the Flag Project. The flag holder locations are marked with paint at the edge of the asphalt. They were, of course, painted over. Locating some of the flag holders did present a challenge. The five flag holders in front of Country Club Drive was the biggest problem. As a result only one flag was up for some of the holidays. That has been fixed. There were a couple of accidents in July and August. Both insurance claims were honored and the sites repaired.

2020 Sea Turtle Nesting Season at LBTS By Mary Ellen Campbell


Nothing was spared interference from the COVID19 virus, not even the seasonal group efforts of SCUTE. Right from the start, our April meeting was canceled, and training of new walkers was forbidden.

The South Carolina Department of Natural Resources closely monitored all the volunteer groups state-wide to keep us compliant with COVID19 safety regulations. Unfortunately, the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources (DNR) was not deemed an essential organization, so the directors were furloughed, but they did their best to continue to protect the environment from home.

The founder and leader of SCUTE kept his cool, waded through all the changing directives, and got us through the season despite his battle with cancer.

Here at LBTS we had only two nests in 2020. Who knows why. 2019 had been an extremely productive year and some experts thought it may continue. On June 4, our first mama Loggerhead came up early in the morning and was still in process when our walkers came upon her. It was not quite dawn.

The well-seasoned SCUTE team knew to stay back and let her complete her natural mission without any disturbance. They filmed from a distance with tears in their eyes. Joan Withers and her team watched as the Loggerhead covered her eggs, smoothed her nest and made her way back to the sea with flippers not made for land, but a body slightly lighter from the 96 eggs she had left behind.



Only nine of her hatchlings made it to the ocean 65 days later. This was due to the heavy over-wash caused by hurricane Isaias on August 4, and early crab invasions to the nest.

The second nest was laid on July 31st and did not fair as well. At only 4 days into incubation, it was covered by water and sand from the hurricane. We were able to protect the nest again with fencing, but the chamber was filled with heavy wet sand and the eggs did not survive.

The story was the same for Pawleys Island, Litchfield, Huntington, and most of the area. Many of the nests were lost to the storm surge. It is sad, but nature has both given and taken.

Ever hopeful for 2021



Why we came to The Tradition





Tradition Health Forum

MEMORY LOSS

I had a great idea for our health forum this month but I forgot when it came time to ask Dr. Vandergriff for his article. So he thought Memory Loss would be a great topic.

Many of us feel that losing memory is just part of the aging process. And this is true to some extent, but identifying the cause of the memory loss can lead to important treatment options.

Dementia occurs in about 5% of the adult population. Your lifetime risk of developing dementia is about 17%, with the risk doubling every 10 years from the age of 60 and up.

Alzheimer's dementia makes up the vast majority of cases at 60-80%. Vascular dementia is the cause in about 10%, but can coexist with Alzheimer's dementia. Lewy body dementia, Parkinson's related dementia, normal pressure hydrocephalus, and frontotemporal dementia make up the remaining cases. Age is the greatest risk factor for developing dementia. Family history, cardiovascular disease, diabetes, and obesity are also risk factors.

The initial symptoms noticed may be mild, such as interference with activities of daily living. Problems balancing the checkbook, paying bills, or remembering to take medications on time are just a few examples. As the disease progresses, major impairments such as eating, dressing, bathing, continence, toileting, and ambulating can develop.







Medications can sometimes complicate cognition. There is a special list called the Beers Criteria created in 2012 at Duke's Clinical Research Institute:

beers-criteria-medication-list



You should look at this list to determine if you are taking a potentially dangerous medication if you are over the age of 65.

Although these medications will not cause dementia, they are a factor in causing confusion or increased risk for other health issues.

How might your doctor evaluate you for memory decline? The most commonly used screening tool is the Mini Mental State Exam. This takes just a few minutes to perform and has a very high sensitivity for detecting dementia. If the screening exam is positive, then further testing may be indicated.

Screening for depression, lab testing, and brain imaging can help look for other causes of memory impairment. Some important labs to consider include anemia, B12, thyroid, diabetes, liver, and kidney testing. MRI of the brain without contrast is the preferred imaging, as this is much more sensitive for identifying stroke or brain lesions.

That is just a brief overview of memory decline and dementia. If you have any concerns for yourself or a family member, please contact your local primary care provider. Just don't forget to write down the time and date of the appointment!

With restaurants closed to inside dining most of the summer and take-out only, grocery stores became a necessary entity. Although early on, the shelves were bare of produce, meat, and paper products, over time we have seen these items back in stock, although still, in some cases, in limited supply.

Cooking meals during the COVID pandemic has become a requirement. For some that meant taking the cardboard out of the oven, finally! But what to cook? You can tire quickly of the same old, same old, over and over. What to do to spruce up dinners cooked at home? Well, some have chosen to go the route of home delivery of meal kits.

Home Chef, Hello Fresh, Every Plate, Sun Basket, Blue Apron and more. These businesses send all the ingredients you need to create a well-seasoned meal of meat, starch and vegetables, or gluten free and vegetarian if preferred. They are proportioned perfectly for the number of servings with no waste and few leftovers. Most of us really are not interested in eating leftovers for several days after the main event. Did we ever really learn to cook for 2 or do we still cook for the masses?





For those of us who enjoy the art of cooking and don't mind a trip to Publix every week there are other ways to boost your flavor profiles. The internet has a plethora of recipes to choose from. You can even find the recipes for those home delivery kits and make them yourself (for a fraction of the cost). They usually have simple, fast instructions and easy-to-find ingredients. Many of which you may already have on hand. Two of my favorites were Korean Bibimbap, which was far tastier than it sounds and Enchilada Verdes. I do favor Mexican but had never used green enchilada sauce before. Now I am stocking up. Poblano peppers made their way into my shopping cart too, just need to be careful removing the seeds, like jalapenos. I found out the hard way.

You may find that swapping out Bob Evan's mashed potatoes for couscous or jasmine rice is a welcome change. I love those new make your rice in 90 seconds packages. For a vegetable, zucchini is very versatile; sliced, diced, julienned and spiraled. Experimenting with spices also makes a huge difference in the outcome. Just be cautious of the cayenne and red pepper flakes if you have a sensitive palette.

While searching recipes to try at my home, I came across a spice combo list that defines the content of every type of spice used in the Hello Fresh Recipes. I have a collection of spices lining my pantry, all in alphabetic order, I might add. I can put together any combination, plus add my own flair. Here is a copy of that spice list.



John Melzer Memorial Plaque Unveiled June 24th







KNOW YOUR CLUB FACE ANGLES —By Steve Dresser, PGA Member www.dressergolf.com

It's amazing how the brain and body respond to the club face angle at the top of the backswing. The question is what is making it not be square. Grip? Takeaway? Wrist angles? Pictured below are closed, open and square positions with an explanation of how to identify the face angles and what each can cause.



Pictured left is a *closed clubface* indicated by the face pointing toward the sky and the bowed (flexion) left wrist. If the face stays in this position until impact the ball will go left, however many players instinctively "hold on" through impact and block the ball to the right. They may also be inclined to swing too much in to out in an effort to fight off the closed face.



Here the face is pointing at the ground and my left wrist is cupped, (extension) both signs of an *open clubface*. This ball will go right if nothing changes before impact. These players are more likely to steepen their downswings (over the top) and flip the hands at the ball in a desperate attempt to square the clubface!



Now we see a flat left wrist and a clubface that is parallel to the left wrist and forearm creating a square clubface. From here I can move the club to the ball with little face manipulation and focus more on rotating my body through to a full and balanced finish.

Note: A little open or closed is ok, In fact, many recreational players do well with a slightly closed face.

Moral of the story? Try to have a flat or slightly bowed left wrist at the top.

UNBELIEVABLE!



2020 United State Census By Glen Campbell


The U.S. Constitution empowers the Congress to carry out the census in "such manner as they shall by Law di-

rect" (Article I, Section 2). The purpose of the census is to use the count to determine the number of representatives from each state in Congress and to assist in allocating Federal funding. The Census Bureau takes extreme measures to protect the privacy of each citizen when filing their Census return. The official census records are frozen for 72 years from the date taken. In 2022 for instance, the 1950 Census will be available for the public to view.

When I retired 4 years ago, I committed myself to participating in this year's census. For nine weeks starting in late July this year, I was honored to participate in the U.S. Census as an enumerator. After one week of training both online and at a session in Georgetown, I was sworn in as an agent of the Census Bureau. With my hand-held device and necessary forms provided, I knocked on doors of residents that had not yet filed their census return. Each morning I checked my device for a list of addresses. It started right here in my back yard of Tradition, then over time progressed to Murrells Inlet, Surfside, Garden City and Myrtle Beach. Most days I averaged 50-75 addresses visited.

It was an amazing experience visiting all the diverse neighborhoods just a short drive away. I saw the incredible beach homes along the Atlantic and the intercoastal waterway, as well as some of our less fortunate residents. I came away with a greater appreciation of our own Tradition life.


On a personal note, my ancestors on my mother's side appear in every census starting with the first one taken in 1790. I started researching my family history in the early 1980s (before the assistance of the internet) and find her ancestors arrived in Plymouth, Massachusetts in 1632, just 12 years after the Pilgrims.

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

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
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
