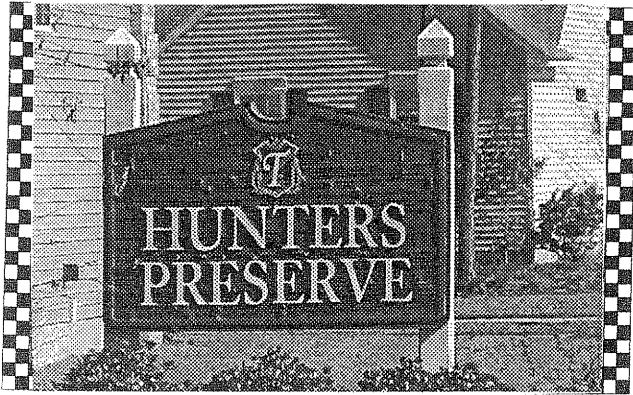

From the TPOA President's Corner by Dick Hajec, President TPOA

The first quarter of Y2K is now history. Did you encounter any of those dreaded problems that were so feared before the end of 1999? I haven't and I have not heard of anyone who has. The only Y2K problem we all face at this time of the year is not unique to this new millennium. It is paying our taxes. But, then again, if you are paying, that only means your income is high enough to warrant payment. We all complain about our taxes, but we will never escape paying our share.

Our operating expenses through the end of February are well under budget even after purchasing pool supplies in bulk to obtain volume discounts. Each of us received a copy of the year 2000 operating budget with the announcement of the March Annual Meeting. Examination of these numbers, and comparison to prior years, reveal that each year our expenses increase as certain costs increase because we have been a growing community. For example: electricity costs increase because we have more street lights; we pay more as an Association, to the Willbrook Road Maintenance District, and our payments to Chicora increase also because we have more TPOA members. These types of expense increases will stabilize by the end of 2000 when the community will be completely closed out with Centex. Since our year 2000 budget is based on 375 lots being sold, and the total "build out" number is 405, the year 2001 budget will most likely be higher than year 2000. However, only inflationary pressures should influence future budgets.

Our Board of Directors organizational meeting resulted in the following residents being elected:

Vice President—Ronald A. Brugge
Secretary/Treasurer—Maurice (Moe) Blais

We have also created a special committee that is studying the value of repair and operation of the fountain at the Willbrook Boulevard entrance to our community.

One final note: please remember that all of your operating committees and directors are voluntary positions. This is your community. We can always use more volunteers to keep it a fun place, a clean place, and safe place to live.

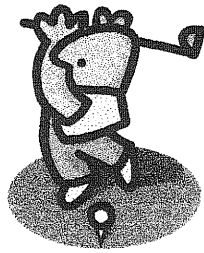
Arts and Crafts

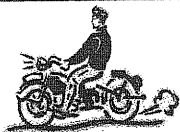


**Tradition Golf School
Tip of the Month**

“Steer the Car for a better release”

One of the most common swing flaws we encounter is a breakdown of the left arm and wrist (for right handed players) at the through impact. Often the elbow bends, and the wrist collapses, creating a flipping action with the hands and a chicken wing in the arm. This often happens due to improper rotation of the arms through impact. To picture proper rotation and a full release of the club, imagine turning a steering wheel in a car to the left. Note how the arms cross over without any bending at the elbows or wrists. Apply this same technique to your golf swing and you will be well on your way to crisper, straighter shots.

- ◆ **Team 4** is Wayne Conrad. Wayne has Sand Fiddler Drive, Lamplighter, and Monarch Court.

It is the committee's intention for this new arrangement to improve communications, and get items that need attention to the correct people for further action.

Frequently asked questions with their answers:

- Q - Who is responsible for the green utility boxes located in the front yards?
- A - The electrical (larger green) box belongs to Santee Cooper (237-9222). The tall (square) light green box belongs to GTE (1-800-483-4000). The small round green box is for TV and belongs to Time Warner (913-7941).
- Q - How do I purchase a new mailbox and post that is required to match all others?
- A - Order it from *Sign It Quick* at 293-9855.
- Q - What color and where can I get the paint to match the mail box post?
- A - The color is *Niagara Mist* which is available from Sherwin Williams in Murrells Inlet at 651-3718.
- Q - If a storm drain is stopped up, who do I call?
- A - Call Georgetown Roads and Bridges at 546-7447.
- Q - If the water in the main water line breaks or the main sewer line out at the street stops up or breaks, who do I call?
- A - Call Georgetown Water and Sewer at 546-8408.
- Q - If the street light is out, who do I call?
- A - Call Santee Cooper at 237-9222. Give them the pole number. (It is on the yellow sticker about 4 feet up and usually starts with the letter "L"). It is a great help to Santee Cooper to either give your house number or tag the pole. You can also call a member of the Building and Grounds Committee

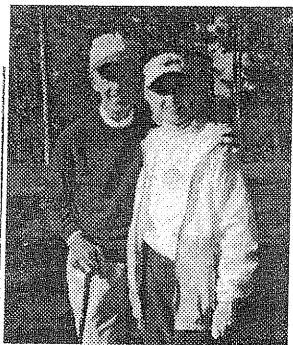

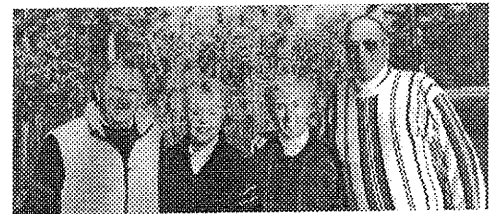

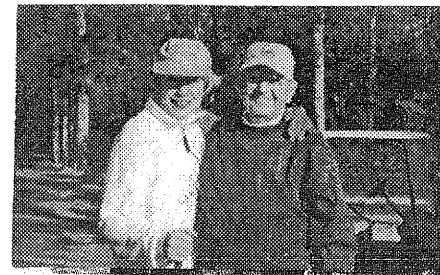

Getting to Know Our Neighbors

Gloria and Frank Walsh have lived in the Tradition since 1998, coming from southern New Jersey. They spent the first six months in South Carolina living in the Myrtle Beach area while their home on Tradition Club Drive was being built.

While living in Ohio in 1981, Gloria attended a pressed flower workshop at a local Garden Club, and was instantly intrigued by the creative possibilities to be achieved with pressed flowers. She bought books for suggestions, experimented with various types of arrangements, and became passionate on the subject. She began entering flower shows, including the largest one in the United States, sponsored by The Pennsylvania Horticulture Society. The first few years Gloria didn't win any prizes, but honed her skills and became more adept with her arrangements. Her first prize was a blue ribbon won for a lampshade decorated with pressed flowers. This was the beginning of many awards received for her work.

While exhibiting at the PA Horticulture Society, Gloria's work caught the eye of Nobuo Sugino, a Japanese artist who built a museum in Japan just to exhibit work done with pressed flowers. Gloria was one of seven or eight American artists whose work was selected for inclusion in this museum. Mr. Sugino also published a beautiful colored book of his selections. Three of her arrangements are shown in the book, including a magnificent peacock with the plumage made from pampas grass flowers, the body from a large tulip petal and a hydrangea petal forming the head. This was all mounted on a piece of rice paper and framed.

Another picture in the book is a basket of flowers mounted on a nautical chart. Prior to retirement Gloria and Frank did a great deal of sailing on their yacht, and Gloria occasionally uses nautical backgrounds for her arrangements.

Gloria's creativity is evident in the varied backgrounds used for her pictures, from oriental scenes done on rice paper to fascinating wildlife arrangements mounted on subtle wallpaper. One of Gloria's arrangements is done on black velvet using assorted pansies, oleander blossoms, clover and hydrangea petals. A small three-part oriental screen on which Gloria created a life-like blue bird and a butterfly won a first place award. Another favorite is a picture of her grandson playing on the beach, which she mounted on mat paper and surrounded with delicate blossoms.

Gloria grows all her own flowers for pressing, and is always on the lookout for interesting weeds, ferns and wildflowers. She keeps several phone books in her car just in case she happens to come across a particularly attractive weed at the side of the road. She currently has

approximately 30 telephone books filled with wild flowers in various stages of drying. The flowers must be picked prior to reaching their peak, and must be absolutely dry when picked. The dried flowers are glued on the background of choice, allowed to dry, sprayed with acrylic, and framed. They can be preserved for up to two years before using.

Frank Walsh, an avid golfer, is also a very talented artist. His oil and watercolor paintings are prominently displayed in their home.

It was a pleasure to see the work of this very talented couple.

Litchfield Road Maintenance District

Litchfield Company executives met with Georgetown County Planning Commission representatives in March to discuss the new road to run between Willbrook Blvd. and Sandy Island Rd. The road, to be built by Litchfield Company as a commitment set forth in the original Willbrook Planned Unit Development (PUD), will provide access to the new Middle School. After the road is completed, road maintenance will be turned over to the County. The Road Maintenance District (i.e., the Tradition homeowners, among others) will have no maintenance obligations for the new road. Work on the road is still temporarily "on hold" to resolve the issue with the Red-cockaded woodpecker (endangered species). Resolution is expected within the month.

On a related road maintenance matter, patch paving work to fill a sizable "dip" on the Southbound lane of Kings River Rd. at the end of the Willbrook Plantation white fence is scheduled for completion in April or early May. Potholes in the middle of Kings River Rd.

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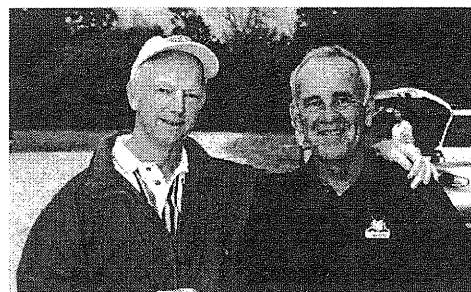
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Tradition Yard Sale
