Winter's dormant lawns with irrigation systems turned off give us relief from rust problems. Before spring comes around, a thought for those who have continuous rust problems (in spite of chemical irrigation systems). One solution is to purchase a separate water meter from Georgetown County for outside use. It is expensive, around \$1000, but water for outside use is less expensive (no sewer charge), and there is no rust problem. This offer may not continue indefinitely, as servicing the growing population is straining the Water Dept.

### Some subjects of concern:

- 1. Do-it-yourself concrete sealers are not recommended. These coatings can turn dark; also can be slippery.
- 2. Overnight parking a covenant violation. The Board has determined that overnight parking is measured by "dusk to dawn". If parking overnight, please pull cars into driveway.
- 3. Numbers on both sides of the mailbox (Fire Dept. request)
- 4. Mailbox disrepair. Please check over your mailbox. We have information on repair and paint formula.

MELP: We need two new volunteers on the Covenants Committee. Before you say no, please read on. We have a one hour meeting once a month. There are 8 areas, no one is overloaded; you are not assigned where you live. Twice a month look over your area; send a gentle reminder to residents in violation, and these are few. If problems persist, the management company takes care of the violations. This is an important way to serve your community by giving a minimum amount of your time. Please call 235-3566.

I had no idea how much was involved in maintaining our community until I started spending time with Howard Krauth, the previous manager, (have you noticed the smile on his face?), and his committee: **Walt Murren**, **Bob Thompson**, **Jim Conway**, **Dave Phillips**, **and Tom Ellison**. They are to be commended for their efforts. They have done much of the work themselves, saving the association a tremendous amount of money. This has kept our HOA fees down.

The volunteers that look after the sprinkler systems and fountains in our common areas also need to be recognized. They are, **Tom Ellison Dan Coughlin, Bob Thompson, Tom Maguire, Charles Olnhausen, Jim Parker, Tom Shaw, Jim Davis, and Marion Culpepper.** 

To continue our efforts to maintain and improve our community, with the goal being to keep our HOA fees low, we need to do as much of the work as we can ourselves. In order to do this, we need volunteers. If interested, give your e-mail address to Vince Franco so he can keep you advised of upcoming projects, pool opening, spring cleaning, etc., or you can attend the monthly Building and Grounds meeting which is held on the first Tuesday of every month at 7:30 p.m. at the Residents' Clubhouse.

All the signage posts have recently been painted. We eventually want to put a protective material around the bottom of the posts. Until then, would those of you that have posts in front of your residences, and maintain the grass around them, please try to avoid hitting the bottoms with your mowers and weed whackers. If you have a lawn service, please ask them to do the same.

We are undertaking a large project this year. A seal coat is going to be applied to approximately one third of our roads. This is being done to preserve the life of our streets. Another third will be done in 2007, and the last third in 2008. This project will require the cooperation of everyone. More on this will be covered in detail at the annual Homeowners meeting in February.

In closing, I ask that you call me if you see anything in the community that looks as if it is in need of repair, such as irrigation malfunctions, property damage, swimming pool & clubhouse conditions, etc.

This will enable us to correct the problem as quickly as possible.

### **ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW BOARD**

Just a reminder to everyone that as of the first of the year, we are applying a \$25 refundable fee to all permits that *do not* require a fee charge. The refund will be in the form of the check you give us that we will not cash for the life of the permit.

Also please remember that some time is required for the issuance of a permit. Usually a minimum of 2 weeks but depending when the meeting is, it could be 4 weeks. Thanks.

### KNOW YOUR NUMBER

It is estimated that 50 million Americans have high blood pressure (HBP). Half of this group is unaware of it. Of the half that is aware, only half of them are treated and controlled. Thus, only one quarter of the people with HBP have it adequately controlled.

HBP is a treatable disease. Pharmaceutical research led to the development of many safe and effective drugs to treat and control it. Your physician has many drugs to choose from to fit individual situations.

Ideal blood pressure is generally thought to be 120/80. That is, 120 systolic pressure over 80 diastolic pressure. HBP is thought to exist when the systolic pressure is over 140 and the diastolic pressure is over 90. A true determination of HBP is made from multiple pressure readings while at rest.

For years, many physicians accepted that if the diastolic pressure was normal, there might have been no reason for much concern if the systolic pressure was elevated.

Several authoritative organizations, the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, the National Institute of Health, and the American Heart Association, had been paying much more attention, especially in older people, to the first (systolic pressure) number. If found to be high, they recommend "aggressive" treatment.

The problem is that while HBP rarely appears on a death certificate, it may indeed be the leading cause of death. This is due to the excessive pressure on the blood vessel walls and the extra workload on the heart. HBP is called the "Silent Killer" because symptoms may not appear until damage occurs. The damage may lead to heart attacks, congestive heart failure, strokes, kidney failure, blindness, and dementia.

It is recommended that you have your blood pressure checked at least once per year, preferably several times per year.

An idea of your situation can be determined by use of the blood pressure machines found in many drug stores. However, if not calibrated properly, they may be a little off. A good choice would be the ones found in the main lobbies of the Georgetown and Waccamaw Hospitals. Another source is the purchase of a blood pressure cuff to gauge your pressure at home. Also, a group from Georgetown Memorial Hospital holds a health fair at the Inlet Square Mall in Murrells Inlet every Thursday from 10 AM until 2 PM where they offer a free blood pressure check, in addition to other health checks. Pay these folks a visit; you have everything to gain.


#### Gone But Not Forgotten

### TIP OF THE MONTH

### Lead With the Hands

One of the reasons tour players hit their irons so far is they de-loft the club at impact by making sure the shaft leans toward the target at impact. Most weekend players add loft to their clubs by leaning the shaft away from the target and bending their left wrist at impact, usually during an ill - fated attempt to scoop the ball into the air. This is also a source of many topped and chunked shots which is why we refer to this as the "Killer Move" in our golf school.

To attain a "firmer" feel at impact, practice some very short shots with an 8 iron keeping the body very still on the back swing and following through to an abbreviated finish. Try to hold your finish. The club head should be low, the left wrist firm or flat with the handle of the club well past your left side. It's a little bit of a "punching" action similar to the swing used to getting the ball out of the trees!

The ball should pop off the face but with a low trajectory. After doing this a few times, go ahead and turn through to a full finish trying to sense that same firm feel at impact. This move will teach you to "trap" the ball with your irons, the way tour players do, because your hands will be ahead of the clubface and the shaft will be leaning forward at impact.

Generally, the more loft there is on the club, the more you want to position your hands ahead of the clubface. This also holds true if you have a poor lie.
