Architectural Review Board Vince Civitarese-237-3568 I am sitting here writing this newsletter as I look out my window at the tail end of Ophelia. It appears good luck was with us. No one was hurt, no property damage and no cost to the Association. We should always be this lucky.

After the tragic accident on Kings River Road, I contacted our county councilman, Jerry Oakley, and requested that the county "double line" both Willbrook Boulevard and Kings River Road. Both roads are 35 mph speed limits, and it does not make sense to pass on these streets. As you can now see, both streets are **double lined**. So please, do not pass on these streets.

The streets mentioned above have now been turned over to the county. We are no longer responsible for their maintenance. However, we continue to pay part of our dues to maintain the lawns, shrubs and signs along both Kings River Road and Willbrook Boulevard. We are only one of many associations paying for this upkeep. We will be receiving a refund that was in reserve for road maintenance. I do not have a figure at this time, but the Board will place this money into our budget planning for 2006.

I am also receiving calls from residents regarding other residents who are speeding on Tradition Club Drive. This Association has a written agreement with the County Sheriff's Office to patrol and dispense tickets based on our traffic signs. I have contacted the Sheriff's Office, and they will patrol, especially in the morning, as this seems to be the most frequent time for speeding. This is a safety issue. Neighbors do recognize the speeders, so please, do not place us in a position where we have to issue names to the police.

We have received complaints about people using our pool who are not residents of Tradition. We do our best to check on these folks. However, it seems difficult to catch them. I recently chased 7 people from the Reserve and retrieved the key they had in their possession. Residents should not be afraid to ask folks where they live, and our residents should not be offended if you are not recognized and are also questioned. It is tough to know every resident.

We continue to have residents performing work that changes the exterior of their homes, as well as making major changes to their landscaping, without meeting with the Architectural Review Board (ARB). In most cases the work is permitted under our Covenants, and the ARB would have issued a permit. Unfortunately, occasions have arisen when work was completed that was not permitted under the Covenants, and we have had to ask the homeowner to modify or remove the violation. This becomes costly to the resident and is not something we like to do to a neighbor. Both time and money can be saved by meeting with the ARB.

The Board of Directors along with our maintenance manager have been spending a great deal of time with a professional engineering firm studying our streets and drainage. I plan to have a full report ready for a community wide meeting that will be held later this fall at the Coastal Carolina Building at the end of Willbrook Boulevard. You will be notified.

I am very pleased to report that our budget is on track for 2005. Barring any unforeseen circumstances, we will end the year as planned. You can read Board Minutes on our web site or pick up a set of minutes in the mailbox located to the left of the pool house door.

Have a great holiday season, and I hope to see everyone at the special fall meeting.

Building and Grounds

A lot has been said, and rightfully so, about our volunteers and the work they do to help preserve our community. Without them we would be at a loss.

I would like to spend a little time saying thanks to the contractors that do work for our community. As you all know, a good contractor is hard to find.

Number one on the list is Pryor Landscaping, our landscaping contractor. They are here every week, mostly on Tuesday, cutting, trimming and fertilizing all of our common areas. If we had a severe hurricane, they would do the clean up.

Waccamaw Management is our pool service contractor. They maintain our pool and keep the water quality up to DHEC standards. They also clean the pool deck and in case of a hurricane, group our furniture so it doesn't end up in the golf clubhouse.

Our flowerbeds are designed and planted by Waccamaw Landscaping (not connected to Waccamaw Management). They have been with us for two planting seasons and have done an exceptionally good job.

The engineer that maintains our storm water waste system is Williams Engineering. They have cleaned out our catch basins and solved a number of our drainage problems. They also installed our front entrance road pavers.

Although these are not all of the contractors that do work for us, they are the ones that do the majority of the day to day work we require.

Like I said in the beginning, volunteers are needed but it's good to have contractors that we can rely on for projects that are too big for Buildings and Grounds to handle.

If you have any questions or suggestions for this committee, do not hesitate to call. I wish to thank all the residents who volunteer their time and especially the members of my committee

With the summer behind us I would like to remind all of our members that before any work is done on their homes, a permit needs to be obtained. This includes the installation of shutters and the cutting down of all trees. If there is any doubt about the requirement for a permit, please feel free to call an ARB member. Remember to allow time for a permit to be processed. Two weeks is the preferred time, but it could take longer depending when the permit application is filed.

A new \$25 refundable fee has been added to the requirement for an application to be processed. This new fee will start on the first of the year. This will allow the ARB to track the completion of projects and help us clear our records of completions.

COVENANTS COMMITTEE

Many thanks to all who are making a valiant effort to keep iron rust under control. It is difficult and seems at times to be an insurmountable problem. A lengthy flyer was delivered to many residents two months ago. This has helped but has not been as successful as we hoped.

The quickest (about 20 minutes), easiest and least expensive solution is to use a garden pressure sprayer with a mixture of eight ounces of oxalic acid powder in a gallon of water. This will usually remove the rust from your concrete and vinyl siding surfaces. Sensitive shrubs should be flushed. The powder is available at Scofield Hardware, just over the bridge in Georgetown; cost \$4 per pound. There are liquid forms of rust removers, usually more expensive, and one must read instructions carefully to prevent damage to grass and shrubs.

Other concerns brought to our attention are:

Overnight parking on the street: Page 5 Covenants Booklet - No "on street" parking overnight. This is a hazard and a Covenant violation.


Boats: Page 4 Covenants Booklet - Recreational equipment (boats, campers, etc.) may be parked for 24 hours for loading and unloading. Storage must be off site or in garage.

A Separate Note to Renters: We ask your help if the property you are renting is not being kept according to community standards. Please contact the homeowner to make arrangements for proper maintenance.

GOURMET DINERS CLUB


In Our Fourth Season

TIP OF THE MONTH

Winter is near. That time of year when temperatures drop and handicaps soar! Don't be discouraged if you don't play your best golf during the chillier months. Most people don't, but that doesn't mean you can't still enjoy yourselves out there. Here are a few tips to help you battle the elements.

- 1. Be aware the ball doesn't carry as far in cool weather. Take a little more club and swing smoothly.
- 2. Give yourself a few minutes before tee time to stretch and limber up a bit. It's much easier to "get loose" in the summer than it is in the winter.
- 3. Dress for success. Layer your clothing properly so you can remain warm but swing freely. I like to start with a turtleneck followed by a vest, then a sweatshirt and finally a windshirt. You may think that 4 layers will make you look like the Michelin Man, but this combination works well and allows you to peel off a layer or two when it warms up in the middle of the day. Don't forget your longjohns for the lower body.
- 4. The wind can blow a bit more in the winter. Learn to "punch" the ball under the wind by playing the ball back in your stance a bit and making a 3/4 backswing and an abbreviated follow through.
- 5. Be sure to switch from clear liquors to dark! Scotch or Irish whiskey make for a nice "swing oil" so you won't even feel the cold. Just remember, you didn't hear that one from me! *Good luck with your games.*



LADIES WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON BRIDGE
